### A Message From Your Superintendent

This Spring edition of The Banner includes information about the 2018-2019 school budget, a smaller-scale facilities improvement project, various student awards of achievement and recognition, and the announcement of this year's Distinguished Alumni Commencement Speaker. It also serves to announce candidates seeking election/re-election to the school board.

On Tuesday, May 15, 2018, eligible district residents will have the option to vote on the proposed expenditure budget of \$17,057,539 as Proposition #1. This represents a slight decrease from the current year. For the sixth straight year, we have reduced anticipated expenditures to lessen the use of reserves necessary to balance the budget without compromising our primary responsibility to provide quality programs and services for our students.



Also on the ballot will be the option to vote for three open board seats. Incumbents Candice Gancasz, Virginia Voss, and Randall Atwater will seek additional three-year terms. The deadline for submitting applications was Monday, April 16, 2018.

The projected tax rate increase for District homeowners is estimated to be below 2% (1.84%) and well below the NYS Tax Cap allowance. The school budget vote will take place in the Herbert F. Ludwig Auditorium from 12:00 PM to 8:00 PM. You will find additional information about the proposed 2018-2019 school budget on pages 4-6.

A smaller-scale improvement project or Capital Outlay is an efficient and economical way to make important upgrades to the campus of up to \$100,000. The approval process is much more streamlined than larger–scale projects requiring an extensive State Education Department review and more economical in that the State will reimburse the District at the building-aid rate of 86% in the following year. This general budget allocation of \$100,000 will be used to fund repairs to sidewalks and security enhancements through the installation of additional intruder locks on classroom/office doors.

Best wishes in retirement go to Mrs. Patti Alvarez. Mrs. Alvarez has served the District for the past 21 years with plans to relocate near her children in North Carolina. Her daughter, Kelsey, is a school teacher in the Charlotte-Mecklenburg School District and son, Tony, is a graphic designer, also in the Charlotte area.

With the end of the 2017-2018 school year quickly coming to a close, I extend a sincere thank you on behalf of all associated with Barker Central School. We are proud of our students and recognize that their success could not have been possible without your support. It will always be the contributions of individuals and groups, within the school and the community, that will continue to make Barker Central School District stand above the rest.

As the date of my retirement nears, please know that it has been an honor to have served as a school administrator since July of 2000, and as your school superintendent for the past eleven (11) years.

### Best Wishes in Retirement & Celebrating a Job Well Done

Dr. Klatt's decorated career in public education as a teacher, coach, and administrator spans over three (3) decades. His career began as a teacher at Albion where he was named "Educator of the Year" in 1995. Since 2000, Dr. Klatt has served the Barker Central School District as the Middle School Principal (2000-2003), Director of Instructional Services (2003-2006), Assistant Superintendent (2006-2007), and for the past eleven (11) years as our devoted Superintendent of Schools. In 2013, Dr. Klatt accepted the challenge from the Barker and Roy-Hart Boards of Education to be one of only a few shared superintendents in New York State. He continued as the leader of both the Barker and Roy-Hart Districts through 2018.

The Barker Central School District has many accomplishments under Dr. Klatt's leadership during his tenure. To name a couple, the US News and World Report recognized Barker with a "Silver Medal" rating and on two occasions, Business First ranked BCS 2nd out of 429 upstate schools in the area of "Achievement Index".

A few of Dr. Klatt's personal honors include his induction into the Genesee Community College Distinguished Alumni Hall of Fame (2015), being selected as "Educational Leader of the Year" by Niagara University (2014), and he received the Coca-Cola Educator of Distinction award in 2010.

As one of the most respected and veteran Superintendents in the area, he has served as the Orleans-Niagara BOCES representative to the House of Delegates, was on the NYS Education Commissioner's Advisory Council, and was a Middle Level Liaison to the State Education Department. Dr. Klatt has presented at state and national conferences and his work has been published and cited in professional journals.

For eighteen (18) years he has put the service to the Barker school/community above himself. The Board of Education and District would like to wish Dr. Roger J. Klatt and his family much health and happiness in the years to come, and a heartfelt thank you for his dedicated service to the district and community. The increase in State Aid is due to an increase in Foundation Aid, Building Aid, and Excess Cost Aid. The Somerset power plant will not have a separate PILOT agreement this school year. The power plant will now be making a tax payment and not a PILOT payment. This results in an increase to the tax levy and a corresponding decrease in PILOT payments.

The Interfund Transfers represent a Capital Outlay Project of \$100,000. The District intends to repair existing sidewalks at frequently used entrances to the school as well as replacing older style classroom hardware with intruder style locks.



### **Qualifications of a Voter**

You qualify as a voter if: you are a citizen of the United States; you have been a resident of the Barker Central School District for at least 30 days prior to the school budget vote and election held on May 15, 2018; you are at least eighteen (18) years of age; you are qualified to register for an election in accordance with Section 5-106 of the Election Law. In addition, you do not need to be a property owner to be eligible to vote.

### **Ballot Scanner System Now in Third Year of Use**

This will mark the third year using the electronic scanning machines for the budget vote and School Board member election. If you are unfamiliar with the process, we will have instructions, samples of the two-sided ballots, and people on site to assist you.

The ballot scanner system is a portable electronic voting system that uses an optical scanner to read marked paper ballots and tally the results. This system allows for paper ballots to be immediately tabulated at the polling site. The system will also notify you of any voting errors. You will be able to immediately correct these errors to ensure that "Your Vote Counts!"

# Reimer Selected as Next Superintendent of Barker Central Schools

The Barker Board of Education at its April 9th meeting selected Mr. Jacob L. Reimer as the District's new Superintendent of Schools, effective July 1, 2018, after the retirement of Dr. Roger Klatt. The Board action culminates a six month search process that attracted 18 candidates for the position. Drs. William Silky and Suzanne Gilmour of Castallo & Silky LLC in Syracuse served as consultants to the Board during the search process.

Mr. Reimer is presently Assistant Superintendent for Human Resources in the Brockport Central School District. Mr. Reimer was a classroom science teacher in Webster and Rochester schools before his career in school administration. Mr. Reimer also served as Director of Finance and Instructional Technology in Marion Central School District for eight years where he had a broad range of administrative responsibilities.

With a need for water safety instruction, children ages 5-10 were given the opportunity to be part of the "Building Your Swimmer One








