A Message From Your Superintendent



Dear Resident,

We have enjoyed pleasant weather throughout November. Hopefully, it is an indication that the 2015-2016 winter season will be less eventful than last year, which required the use of four emergency closing days and several delayed openings. There are four (4) emergency closing days available in this year's school calendar.

With the likelihood that the winter season will present unsafe weather and travel conditions, it is important that the process of closing or delaying school be outlined for you. If you have not already done so, we encourage you to make arrangements for full day closings, delayed openings and early release events. A parent/guardian can choose to keep his/her child at home whether or not school is closed due to poor weather conditions. In these situations,

please contact the school for attendance purposes.

Weather conditions may not warrant closing or delaying school, but driving can be challenging nevertheless. The district's long-standing policy ensures that all students have the opportunity to ride the bus to and from school. In addition, we encourage student drivers to ride the bus when conditions make for difficult driving. There may be situations where conditions deteriorate by the end of the school day. For that reason, we recommend that student drivers take the bus home and leave their vehicles at school until conditions improve.

We will continue to use the automated messaging system to inform you of delays and closures as quickly as possible. If your preferred contact information has recently changed, please contact the school. In addition, we will contact the following television and radio stations to help with notifications:

Mrs. Fuerch discusses Smart Snacks in School and shows a presentation to the 4th graders at Pratt Elementary.




Hall Walking Available at BCS

Students Experience Life on the Niagara Frontier During the Colonial Era







NYS Rebate Check Eligibility

Are you eligible for a New York rebate check? The property tax freeze credit was established last year and provided a rebate to homeowners (with taxable household income less than \$500,000) for the growth in their school taxes if the school district's tax levy stayed under the property tax cap. This year, homeowners will receive a rebate resulting from the school staying under the property tax cap and for receiving state approval for a multi-year tax efficiency plan.

According to the NYS Department of Taxation and Finance, more than 2 million checks started going out on November 30, and it will likely take months before all the checks are released. The State will automatically mail the checks to eligible homeowners – so you don't have to do anything. If you would like to view the information by county, please visit:

NYS Makes Changes to ELA & Math Assessment

In a few months, students will be participating in the 2016 Grades 3-8 English Language Arts (ELA) and Math tests. The tests ask students to demonstrate and apply their knowledge and skills in the focused areas such as critical thinking, analytical writing, and problem solving.

While no single test provides a complete picture of student achievement, when combined with grades and teacher reports, annual assessments provide important information about a student's progress. The tests give us an objective measurement of how your child, our school, and the district are doing compared to others across the state. Additionally, the tests help ensure that students get the supports they need to be successful.

With the help of New York State educators, the State Education Department has worked hard to ensure that these tests provide a fair and accurate assessment of your child's learning. To date, the following changes have been made:

- Every question on the State assessments was written specifically for New York students, and all test questions have undergone an extensive review process that includes feedback from New York State teachers.
- There will be fewer questions on both the ELA and Math tests, but students will have the same amount of time to complete the test. The tests will continue to be administered over 3 sessions.

State law and Commissioner's regulations prohibit school districts from making promotion or placement decisions based solely or primarily on student performance on the Grades 3-8 ELA and Math tests. Also, until December 31, 2018, school districts cannot include the results of the Grades 3-8 ELA and Math tests on students' official transcripts or permanent records.

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
Invigorating Classroom Instruction Through STEAM

STEAM stands for "Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts and Math". STEAM is an approach to education that offers students real-world learning experiences. Employers are seeking qualified workers with the skills necessary to compete in today's economy. Jobs in the STEAM fields are projected to double in comparison to other industries. STEAM instruction utilizes career ready skills and prepares our students for a successful future. The goal at BCS is to incorporate the STEAM philosophy and concepts into our classrooms.

This past summer several faculty members attended The 2nd Education Collaborative of Western New York STEAM Conference. The conference included sessions that covered all aspects of STEAM with sessions led by K-12 teachers,

college and university professors, and STEAM industry professionals. Some topics included Coding, Differentiating STEAM Classrooms, STEAM Career and Field Explorations, and connecting STEAM with local resources such as the Great Lakes. Those attending were provided information for instructional opportunities and in fostering contacts for networking in order to enrich STEAM at our schools.

Another recent STEAM learning experience attended by faculty was held at the Niagara Falls Aerospace Museum. Teachers were presented with information from several local school districts on how STEAM was integrated within their school. The interactive sessions provided the opportunity to interact with curricular models, technology and engineering approaches being used by schools in the WNY area.



Our STEAM initiative at BCS is continuing to grow and develop. Further information and resources about STEAM will be available on the Barker Central School website in the near future.

Important Adult Education Information

- Doctor's Certificate of Health: A physical examination is suggested prior to participating in physical fitness
 classes.
- **Eligibility:** In general, district residents and non-residents who are 18 years of age or older may enroll. High school students may enroll in any course with instructor approval and parental permission, and the understanding that no credit toward graduation will be granted.
- Senior Citizens: Senior Citizens, residents ages 55 and older, will be provided admission at 50% of the regular fee to all school-sponsored events if they present a Barker Central School District Senior Citizen Card. Non-residents will be required to pay the full admission fee. Registration forms must be submitted. Proof of age is required. In order to take advantage of senior citizen fee discount for courses and some special events, you need a Barker Central School Senior Citizen Card. You may receive this card by coming to the Barker Central School Superintendent's office and registering.
- **Registration:** Mail registration. Early registration protects against having to cancel due to insufficient registration. Please avoid disappointment by enrolling early. Registrants can assume they are officially registered unless notified and should begin attending classes on the scheduled starting date. You may register at the first session of class.
- Is Class Cancelled?: Whenever school is closed during the day due to inclement weather, no classes will be held that evening. Listen to local radio stations WBEN-AM 930 or WLVL-AM 1340 or TV Channels 2, 4 or 7 for school closings. If inclement weather begins later in the day, listen to local radio stations for announcements. Whenever possible, we will utilize the Global Connect system to notify registered students in the event of a cancellation as noted above. Please be sure to provide a valid phone number for this purpose. Do not call the school. When a class cannot be held due to an illness or for other reasons, it is the instructor's responsibility to see that class members are notified. Cancelled classes will be rescheduled by the instructor.
- Material Cost: Additional fees will be charged in classes where textbooks or materials are used. These are to be paid by the second session.
- **Refunds**: Total refunds will be made only if a class is cancelled or filled. Transfer of tuition to another course can be arranged where size of class permits. No transfers after second class meeting. No refunds after classes begin.
