## A MESSAGE FROM YOUR SUPERINTENDENT

Dear Barker Learning Community,

I hope this edition of The Banner finds all of you well and getting ready for the Holiday Season. Time is truly the most valuable resource we have and there never seems to be enough to do all the things we want. During the Holidays, time seems to speed up for us all rather than slow down so I hope all of you are able to carve out time to spend with your loved ones and friends.

As we continue through this school year we continue to see so many great things happening on and around campus. I wanted to touch on a few of these to give you all an idea of all that is going on.

Aportion of our large capital project has been approved by the New York State Department of Education. Specifically, our exterior work including the multipurpose athletic field, windows, tennis courts and parking lot work is set to begin as soon as weather allows. The intent is to have all of this work complete prior to the start of school in the fall. The remaining interior work is not quite approved by the State yet but we are expecting that to come very soon and for work on all interiors to begin over the summer. The renovations inside will take nearly all of next school year to finish with full completion expected by September of 2025. These tentative dates fall exactly in our initial timeline so we continue to be on track for this work. We also have other capital work that is now close to being complete or fully complete. These include the replacement of the air conditioning units that failed in the Jr.-Sr. High School Auditorium, the replacement of a boiler system in our HS gym and pool area, and additional security upgrades to camera systems.

We have also seen the installation of the Niagara County Sheriff's Office communications tower come to completion. This endeavor has allowed for an increased range of radio communication across the district that can be integrated directly with emergency responders here on campus while also providing the Sheriff's Office with improved radio connectivity across our region, which also improves safety for our entire community.

Another important project that was recently completed was our solar array. It was finally connected and turned on by National Grid at the end of October and we are seeing savings already come our way, even during the fall. We expect to see significant savings really roll in starting in the spring through the summer. Again, we should see more than \$60,000 in savings annually over the lifespan of the solar array.

There are so many great things going on around campus and I am excited for what comes next. It still amazes me every single day as to what our students are able to accomplish. We should all be proud of what they have done and what they are poised to do in the future.

I hope to see you around school soon!

# BOCES STUDENTS INDUCTED INTO NATIONAL TECHNICAL HONOR SOCIETY

In November, six Barker students enrolled in BOCES programs at the Orleans Career and Technical Education Center in Medina, and the Niagara Career and Technical Education Center located in Sanborn, were inducted into the National Technical Honor Society. Petra Bish (Cosmetology), Trent Dickinson (Advanced Manufacturing & Engineering), Michayla Greene (Cosmetology), Isabella Joy (Health Occupations Technician), Charles LaGreca (HVAC), and David Merlin (Advanced Manufacturing & Engineering) were among over 100 students at the two BOCES locations who were honored in front of their teachers, families and school district representatives.

The National Technical Honor Society was founded in 1984 and a local chapter was formed in 2007. To be inducted into the NTHS, the students had to maintain an 89.5 grade average in their career and technical education programs and an 84.5 average at their high schools, have superior attendance, exemplary behavior, and be a member in good standing with SkillsUSA, an organization that emphasizes partnership, leadership, and community service. Together with SkillsUSA, the NTHS hope to ensure a skilled workforce. Out of all the high school students in the United States, the National Technical Honor Society students who receive this honor comprise 1.6 percent of that population. The four core objectives of the NTHS are: career development, leadership, service and recognition. ## GARDEN FENCE PROJECT COMPLETED

In the spring of 2003 a small garden was setup at Pratt Elementary School. Over the past 20 years many children have participated in the Garden Club and their working hands have helped to beautify the school and build a community garden full of vegetables, herbs, and flowers.

After almost 20 years, the garden and fence

were in need of a makeover. The transformation process of the garden began in 2021 with a major clean up and the addition of raised beds and soil to the existing space. In 2022, work on the garden fence commenced.

In collaboration with Mrs. Phillips' art students, a contest was held to select a new fence design. Students in grades 2-8 submitted entries for the contest and a preliminary vote was taken to determine the 12 finalists. A District-wide vote took place and the data was tracked by 3<sup>rd</sup> graders using a tally table. In April of 2022,









Noralie Pierce's design was selected as the winner. Also, during the spring of 2022, Mr. Mallon's tech students helped to clean the fence and prep it for a new paint job. Mrs. Phillips and Noralie Pierce painted the fence throughout the 2022-2023 school year. In the fall of 2023, members of the Garden Club, with help from the Jr. High Student Council, put the finishing touches on the fence and boxes.

Mrs. Calandra, Garden Club adviser, encourages community members to stop by over the summer to harvest and enjoy the vegetables and herbs that are ripe for the picking.

The Jr. High Student Council, along with advisers Mrs. Pellow and Mr. Burke, organized the food collection in the homerooms. The top homeroom donation was Mr. DerSarkissian's room with 245 donations. Brenton Burzynski provided 26 items and Sam Liuzzi donated 24. Mr. Jurewicz's homeroom gave 165 items and Kylie Lemis provided 145 of them. The homeroom team of Mr. Pyskaty and Mrs. Pellow provided 76 items. Mrs. Monaco's room added another 75 items. Several other classrooms also donated items.

The Sr. High Student Council was responsible for collecting \$10 "turkey" donations from clubs and sports teams. Individual staff members and groups also donated to the cause. Last year, \$1,000 or 100 turkeys were donated through the combined efforts of BCS Staff and the different organizations. The Sr. High Student Council and adviser, Mr. Pyskaty, reported that this year's Turkey Drive finished with a grand total of \$1,120 contributed. 
